# September Connection

## Meet our new Program Director, Jase Lucas

Jase Lucas is a follower of Jesus.

Since 2013, Jase has been a leader and shaker in the Christian community. With 10 years of experience in family ministries, connectional outreach, church communications, teaching and preaching, and congregational care, he believes that the local church is the hands and feet of God's love in our communities.

Raised in Southern Illinois as a member of the Southern Baptist Convention, Jase served as a children's ministry leader and outreach coordinator starting at the age of 12 through his faith community. In his early years, he grew his ministry as a campus missionary through the SBC and an elected messenger to the denomination's annual meeting. During this time, Jase was a regional coordinator for Prison Fellowship Ministries, working with the families of incarcerated persons to meet physical and spiritual needs.

In 2016, Jase moved to Los Angeles, CA, and began working in inter-denominational settings. He graduated from Biola University in 2019 with a degree in Public Relations and Theology, where he also partnered with university leadership to drive change in the areas of diversity and inclusion. Through these experiences and the radical love of Christ, he built a deeper connection with God which helped him to deconstruct his beliefs about religion, embracing a relationship-based, compassion-oriented, and justice-centric belief system about God and the world. Shortly after, he joined The United Methodist Church to embark in their mission of love and acceptance for all people.

As a gay person of faith, Jase's work has recently focused heavily on reconciling the global church with marginalized groups and others who have been historically harmed by the Christian community. While continuing his ministry to families and children, he also partnered with a number of justice-seeking organizations serving seniors, queer people, and houseless individuals. In the UMC, Jase served as a lay delegate to the California-Pacific Annual Conference and an organizer of the LGBTQIA+ Ministries of the Western Jurisdiction, as well as an advocate for the Church's humanitarian efforts at the US-Mexico border and participant in creation care efforts. Understanding the harm that the universal church has done to so many people in the past, he cares deeping about helping Christ-followers find new ways to meet people where they are without asking them to step into a church building, which led to co-founding The Harmony Podcast Network - a faith-based audio outreach group - in 2023. In LA, Jase worked annually to create a Halloween event to break down walls between the

local church and the community by welcoming families into a safe space; last year, over 1,200 (mostly unchurched) people were warmly embraced in God's house in a single night.

In addition to his work in the faith community, Jase is a lifestyle publicist and founder of The Excellence Agency, a PR firm based in Los Angeles. While he is widely considered an expert in influencer marketing and the role of artificial intelligence in the future of the communications industry, he is also passionate about good coffee, true crime documentaries, and long walks with great company. Since moving to Colorado in 2024, he has served at the City of Longmont, overseeing summer programs for families in need of low-cost childcare. Today, Jase lives in Broomfield, CO, with his fiancé and two cats.

## SEPTEMBER MISSION FOCUS- NOOR EL-SALAM

"A mission to provide light and hope for Syrian refugee children living in Lebanon."

In 2022, Amine Tarhini, a dual citizen of Lebanon and the US, founded this Colorado non-profit to extend educational opportunities to Syrian refugees living in Lebanon. Many of these children were born in Lebanon as their parents fled the Syrian civil war in 2011. The families live in the poorest areas of Beirut and in encampments around the country, unable to legally attend school or work. These conditions create a lost generation, and that hopelessness can lead to very poor outcomes at a societal level.

Knowing that his own success story lies in the foundation of education, he wanted to provide hope in their future to these children and to show them that others care. In the first year, nearly 100 students aged 5-14 completed the academic year. In the second year, the number increased to 165. In 2024-25, the Board took a leap of faith and expanded the numbers to 215 despite not having enough money in the coffers to cover that budget. The need is huge and parents are clamoring at the door having seen the difference school makes in their children's lives.

The focus of the program is on the basics: Math, Science, English, Arabic, and Ethics. The overall message is showing the children they are valuable and loved. While classes take place in rented church classrooms, the school is non-sectarian. Most of the Syrian children are Muslim Kurds.

This church family has been incredibly generous in the past for which the Board is so appreciative. We are looking for outside grants and funding as we expand our donor base. This special September LPUMC Mission drive for funds will help us ensure Noor El-Salam Academy will be able to purchase books for all the children and that they are able to complete another school year!

## Youth Mission Trip 2024

We are Rooted in Love...

From July 20th-27th our Youth traveled to the Lake Traverse Reservation in South Dakota for our mission trip. Our group of 8 youth and adults, joined with 54 other youth and adults from Minnesota and Wisconsin to serve the community and to be the hands and feet of Jesus. We arrived there as strangers but left that community as friends. We spent the week serving, learning, worshipping, growing in our faith, and simply having fun together! While there we were led by three amazing YouthWorks staff members. They made sure that we were well-fed, had plenty to do, had the supplies to do it, and were able to learn about and experience the culture of the Sisseton Wahpeton Oyate, a branch of the Santee Dakota.

On our first day we worked with a gentleman named Johnny who has and continues to pour out his love for his community. We were there to empty a space to be turned into a commercial community kitchen. This involved hauling all sorts of items out of that space, some went to a trailer that would be taken to the dump, and others were moved to a storage space for future use. We did a lot of sorting, carrying, step climbing, sweeping, and working together. None of us could have done the work on our own, but together we accomplished a great deal. Johnny loves his community and loves sharing his community with all who come to serve. He has a passion for making a difference, and when you are around him, it is easy to get excited about all that is possible. He truly has a zest for life and desire to make a difference.

We also spent several days at various local assisted living centers. Our time at these involved some weeding, lots of visiting, some crafting, and of course a few games of Bingo. Time with the special older adults, some with dementia, are treasured memories for our trip. We needed to leave our phones and cameras out of the facilities, so while being completely present, we got to hear their stories, to laugh with them, and to help them feel seen. All of these were holy moments. We were proud of our young people for stepping out and interacting with the residents, offering a time of connection and community.

In addition to our mission work, we also had the opportunity to hear from local Dakota members. One evening we learned about the culture from a man who has been an intricate part of the community for a long time. He spoke about the importance of remaining connected to our heritage, to our history, but also to live each day in the present and to live our lives led by love. He reminded us that resentment only hurts us, and when we live in love, there is a ripple effect of love spreading beyond what we could ever imagine. He spoke from his heart and connected to us at a heart level. On our final evening before returning home, we heard from several members of a local youth camp and newly launched church that is geared at meeting the needs of the local Dakota community. The husband-and-wife founders of Dakota Sonshine told of how they were called to serve the community, and then a local Dakota man and his wife spoke of how they were called to join in this important work and ministry. He expressed the importance of preserving the language and culture of the Dakota people, sharing that less than 1% of those on the reservation can speak the language fluently. Together, along with countless volunteers, they offer a safe place for young people to gather, to grow in their faith, to connect with the culture, and to connect with each other.

In preparation for and upon returning home from this mission trip, we were challenged to find ways to continue to serve and reach out in love to others, to let the mission trip be the beginning of what we can do as a means of authentically loving and serving God and our neighbors! I encourage us all to consider what this means for each of us, what this can look like for each of us.

Lake Traverse is one the few Reservations that continues to partner with mission teams since the pandemic. We are grateful to have had this opportunity to work with and learn from this community. Your support of our mission trip through your prayers and financial sponsorships allowed us the opportunity to serve and gave us the encouragement when we were hot, tired, or discouraged. So, thank you for your love and support for us, which we then carried with us and extended to those we served and served alongside. It truly was a joy to serve alongside our extended church family. Our hearts are full and ready to continue to be the ripple effect of the Love that Jesus has given us.
